Current collaborative projects include archaeological field research in Glacier National Park, MT. Yellowstone National Park, and at Missouri Headwaters State Park, MT. Dean's overall goal is engage in collaborative projects that benefit SKC students.

searching the cliff tops, snags, and skies for pairs of Peregrine Falcons. But I won't be doing that until April. Again, I need to be patient. But if you visit the ponds at Lee Metcalf or other bodies of water, you may have already seen some breeding behavior. A friend and I saw a few Bufflehead pairs on a very gray day; it was so gray that the photo of the male displaying looks as if it's black and white.

Fine then, I'll take it, the tree seems to say, a new slick leaf unfurling like a fist to an open palm, I'll take it all.

Raptor Guardians/Peregrine Watch in the Bitterroot

Once again it is time to make room on your calendar for Raptor Guardians/Peregrine Watch monitoring in the Bitterroot in the Bitterroot. The first monitoring for occupancy generally occurs between late March to early May. Last year, most reports of occupancy occurred in April.

Dave Lockman, retired BNF Wildlife Biologist, will conduct monitoring training via Zoom March 13, 2024 at 4PM. Email Micki at MickiLong@gmail.com for access. Dave established the Watch Territories of the Bitterroot and Sapphire Mountains decades ago and has continued working closely with Jay Sumner and the Montana Peregrine Institute.

Further, limited data indicate that the migratory destinations of many Peregrines lie south of the American border in regions of the world where regulation of pesticides, including the chlorinated hydrocarbons, is virtually unknown. Plainly, immediately identifying any major downward flux in populations is crucial, lest infamous history repeat itself.



About her presentation: Birdie Big Year: Elevating Women Birders. Tiffany Kersten didn't set out to do a Big Year, but after a series of unanticipated and serendipitous events, she suddenly found herself amidst one. As a sexual assault survivor, she spent 2021 traveling to all corners of the Lower 48 States, tallying birds and gifting personal safety alarms to women she met along the way. Her goal was to see 700 species, and to raise awareness of women's safety in the outdoors. She ended up surpassing her goal and setting a new record, of 726 species. In her presentation, Tiffany will lead us through the fear, empowerment, struggles, and healing that all played vital roles in the personal growth she experienced on this wild adventure. 

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
